Little Sir Report:

About the Authors: Frank Falzon is a highly decorated and accomplished police inspector who investigated more than 300 murders and other cases during his 28-year career with the San Francisco Police Department, 22 of them in the homicide detail. He played a key role in breaking the notorious Night Stalker case, investigated his childhood friend and former fellow cop for the murders of San Francisco Mayor George Moscone and Supervisor Harvey Milk, participated in the Zodiac, Zebra, and Juan Corona serial murder investigations, and other high-profile cases. He was a recipient of the San Francisco Police Department's highest honor, the Gold Medal of Valor. He also earned a Gold Medal Medallion as the city's Bravest Police Officer and numerous other commendations and was the department's 1978 Police Officer of the Year. In addition to his role on the Netflix Night Stalker series, Falzon has appeared in The Most Dangerous Animal of All mini-series, Court TV's I, Detective series, and some two dozen documentaries on the city hall murders. Falzon, born in San Francisco, has an AS degree in criminology from City College of San Francisco. He and his wife, Donna, live in Novato, CA. They have four grown children, including two who followed their father's path into law enforcement, and nine grandchildren.

<u>Duffy Jennings</u> was a prize-winning reporter for the San Francisco Chronicle in the tumultuous 1970s. His coverage included the City Hall assassinations of Mayor George Moscone and Supervisor Harvey Milk, the Patty Hearst kidnapping, and the Zodiac and Zebra serial murders. The newspaper submitted his reporting on the murder trial of the City Hall killer, former Supervisor Dan White, for Pulitzer Prize consideration. Jennings is the author of Reporter's

Note Book: A San Francisco Chronicle Journalist's Diary of the Shocking Seventies, published in 2019. All told, Jennings wrote more than five hundred bylined articles for the Chronicle. Jennings' essay, "Paper Boy," appears in the anthology, The End of the Golden Gate: Writers on Loving (and Sometimes Leaving) San Francisco, from Chronicle Books in 2021. Actor Adam Goldberg portrays Duffy in the 2007 film, Zodiac. A San Francisco native, Jennings holds a BA in Journalism from San Francisco State University. He lives in Danville, California with his wife, Bonnie Becker, and has two grown children, a stepdaughter, and two grandsons.

ACTIVITIES: Next poker on Monday, April 7. Wally will email players who plan to be there.



Turning Pages

"California Against the Sea" by Rosanna Xia", 2023; non-fiction

The coastline of California is disappearing into the sea as the inevitable rise in the ocean is causing cliffs and houses and beaches to disappear, setting up confrontations between property owners, who envisioned the million-dollar mansions to last a lifetime or more and communities like Pacifica, whose developers fight for protective barriers or retreating. The author makes it clear that breakwaters and rock barriers are a failure. The societal impact of the rising water and of groundwater influx displaces disadvantaged populations of the underprivileged brown and black communities who have always suffered the consequences of a toxic environment close to the water. Marin City, Pacifica, and Imperial Beach near the Mexican border are described in detail. Eons ago the earliest Native American tribes living on the fused island of Santa Cruz were forced onto the mainland as their huge island broke into small pieces, now the Santa Barbara Islands. The author goes into great detail about all the problems that have existed from Northern to Southern California. The passage of the California Coastal Act in the mid 1970s was a beginning, but enforcement faces years of legal and bureaucratic hurdles. Fortunately, now there are many dedicated people and organizations finding solutions that use natural strategies, recognizing the failure of man-made, short-sighted solutions. The book ends on the north coast south of Fort Bragg, where a brilliant land ownership alliance between the Native American tribe and a neighboring family has preserved a coastal environment for all to enjoy.

This book is easy to read, with many stories about people related as though in a novel. The book received highest acclaim for non-fiction in 2023 and should be read by all, particularly by us in the Bay Area.

"The Sicilian Inheritance" by Jo Piazza, 2024 Fiction

Sara's restaurant in the Italian community in Baltimore is failing as is her marriage to Jack from whom she is separated, with five year old Sophie living with him. Before her death, her great aunt Rosie was planning a trip with Sarah to her home town in Sicily. When she died her aunt had left her a letter charging her with going to her Sicilian village to try to claim a deed she had and to investigate the disappearance of her mother, Serafina in 1903. This complicated generational family drama unfolds in current time, 1966 and 1903. Sara goes to the town in Sicily, where she can trust nobody and struggles to accomplish the almost impossible task her aunt Rose has given her.

This is an immersive family drama that will captivate you, a suspenseful mystery set in a small town with unusual customs and superstitions, whose inhabitants seem determined to make the pesky American woman go home. You will love this drama, as did I.
